THURSDAY, 17 APRIL 2025

TH01 Dawn Chorus – Arcata Marsh Field Trip 1 CLASSIC \$10 **6:30 a.m.-8:30 a.m. Leader: Michael Morris**

The Arcata Marsh & Wildlife Sanctuary is the center of the universe for Humboldt birding, with more species being recorded here than at any other single location in the county. This trip, a “Godwit Days Classic” pre-breakfast outing, is planned to catch the dawn chorus in full swing at the Marsh. Willows along the trails host songbirds and the reed beds support chattering Marsh Wrens. Orange-crowned, Wilson’s and Yellow-rumped Warblers and Common Yellowthroats are in full song, while Song Sparrows sing for mates and re-establish their territories. This trip will provide an introduction to the variety of birds at the Marsh. Terrain is mostly flat on maintained trails. Event repeats Friday (#FR11). TH02 Grouse of Humboldt County \$30 **7:30 a.m. -1:30 p.m. Leader: Rob Fowler**

We’ll start the morning driving Tall Trees access road in Redwood National Park for Ruffed Grouse. After the Tall Trees road Ruffed Grouse search, we’ll head up to Bald Hills Road to look for male Sooty Grouse booming along the road. Up in the oak savannah up in the actual “Bald Hills” we should also encounter the local White-breasted Nuthatch, Western Bluebirds, Chipping Sparrow and other oak woodland species. There might even be a chance to see Golden Eagle or...dare we say....California Condors? This will be mostly a roadside birding trip but some walking up and down hills may be involved in the Bald Hills area so wear sturdy footwear. We will limit this trip to 11 participants and only 4 cars and will carpool to make grousing on

What does one need to say about the Arcata Marsh: NOT MUCH!!!!.... except it is the best birding location in Northwestern California with currently 344 species that have occurred here (with the recent Summer Tanager #344!). Sure, we have dawn choruses and shorebird fly off trips scheduled at the Marsh during the festival. And there's an Audubon-sponsored marsh walk every. Dang. Saturday of the year. But, have you gone on a Godwit Days trip that is specifically at the Marsh to enjoy all the birds and habitats found at this legend of a location? No? Well, do yourself a favor and sign up. NOW!! TH04 Elk River Estuary & Wildlife Sanctuary **\$20**

In 2022, the City of Eureka did a major salt marsh restoration effort south of the Elk River channel, adding many acres of new wetland and mudflats that have proven to be very attractive to waterfowl and shorebirds. Part of the trip will be spent birding this new habitat. The rest of the time will be spent birding the Elk River Wildlife Sanctuary, looking for songbirds in the riparian and other waterbirds on the Elk River. Expect a few miles of walking on very easy and mostly paved terrain. With the close proximity of various wetland and riparian habitats, many species should be seen on this trip. TH06 Azalea State Natural Reserve **\$10**

Godwit Days has never done a field trip to the quaint and attractive Azalea State Natural Reserve in McKinleyville so this year that all changes! It's a great reserve dominated by Sitka Spruce, Red Alder and a lush understory of Western Azalea (*Rhododendron occidentale*) which may be blooming a little bit by then. Common Northwestern coastal forest species can be expected like Hairy and Down Woodpeckers, Wrentit, Pacific Wren, Hermit Warbler (may be early for them), Purple Finch, and more. Expect easy walking on forest trails with little change in elevation. A quick trip to experience this little slice of Humboldt County nature. TH07 Humboldt Bay National Wildlife Refuge **CLASSIC** **FREE**

See a startling diversity of bird life and hear about refuge management for migratory birds and other wildlife. Refuge staff will lead a leisurely, level walk around the refuge on a 2-mile loop trail where numerous waterfowl, shorebirds, and songbird species reside. Restrooms available at refuge headquarters. Spotting scopes available for general use to scan the open water from the viewing window at the refuge. [NOTE: From the Arcata Community Center, it takes about 35 minutes to get to the refuge, which is south of Eureka at the Hookton Road exit of Highway 101.] See the bird species seen at the Humboldt Bay NWR in April [here](#).

TH08 Aldergrove Marsh & Arcata Ridge Trail **FREE**

9:30 a.m.-2:00 p.m. Leader: George Ziminsky

Aldergrove Pond is a small urban pond (renovated in 2022) with some associated riparian habitat. After visiting Aldergrove pond the trip will head over to the The Arcata Ridge Trail access off West End Road. Part of the City of Arcata's Community Forest trail system, the ridge trail follows along Janes Creek, with redwood-forested slopes

above. On the lower beginnings, the trail winds through alder riparian habitat adjacent to a mill site that has some cattail marsh and common riparian-associated birds. The trail then winds upslope into second-growth redwood forest, where the usual redwood forest birds abound. The pace of this trip will be relaxed, it will cover our basic forest and woodland birds. Not much need for a scope, moderate walking on well-maintained but STEEP trails for part of the trip. This is probably the trip with the steepest trails so be prepared for that aspect. TH09 Shorebird Spectacle at the Arcata Marsh 1 **CLASSIC** **\$15**
2:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m. Leader: Mark Colwell

Witness the spectacle as flocks of thousands of shorebirds become tens of thousands, and then form a huge milling swarm. North Humboldt Bay is a shorebird staging site clearly of hemispherical significance. The birds are colorful, sexually charged, and are flying in an energetic manner not seen in fall or winter, plus they often give snatches of summer “song” and other utterances seldom heard at other times. The number of birds on the move can be staggering and can be experienced daily during this northward spring migration push. Shorebird species expected include: Western and Least Sandpiper, Dunlin, Marbled Godwit, Willet, dowitchers, Black-bellied Plover and American Avocet. You may want to bring a snack, there are picnic tables and benches available. Bring a spotting scope if you have one. There will be a restroom available. TH10 Nighttime Owls **CLASSIC** **\$15**

If you have never gone “owling,” this is a great chance to see what is involved. Help scout potential locations through the Arcata Bottom looking for Barn Owl and Short-eared Owl, then visit various locations using tapes or voice calling to elicit responses from nighttime forest owls, including Barred Owls as they become more common in the area. Requires good luck, a flashlight, and warm clothes. SEEING (as opposed to hearing) an owl is never guaranteed, but seeing a Short-eared or Barn Owl is quite possible. Expect variable terrain and possibly wet ground. May be able to use a spotting scope until dark. Restrooms not available once the trip leaves the Community Center.

FR11 Dawn Chorus – Arcata Marsh Field Trip 2 **CLASSIC** **\$10**

Nineteen acre Carlson Park is the only public access to the Mad River within Arcata city limits and provides access to some healthy riparian habitat with easy walking trails.

Carlson has only been accessible to birders since 2017 and for such a small park has already tallied 145 species of birds. Humboldt Bay Municipal Water District Park, just east of Arcata, is popular with summer river visitors looking for a good river spot near Arcata but few birders visit it for birding but it is certainly worthy of more coverage. This trip will spend equal time between these two locations, the latter location being the first time Godwit Days has had a trip to this spot. Join California State Parks staff for a birding and cultural tour of Sue-meg State Park (formerly Patricks Point SP). A State Park interpretive specialist will lead participants on a short tour (30 minutes) of Sumeg Village, a reconstructed Yurok village. There will be opportunities to view seabirds and species associated with the park's Sitka spruce forests and meadows. Participants hopefully will see resident Red Crossbills and Canada Jays, as well as Pacific Wrens and Varied Thrushes. Restrooms are available. California State Parks is a major sponsor of Godwit Days and provides a variety of trips, access to the parks, and their expert staff as guides. Bring a lunch. Restrooms are available. It's been some years since Godwit Days have offered a field trip to Bear River Ridge so time to bring it back! This is the only location in Northwestern California where Horned Larks breed and we'll spend time looking for them and hope for lingering wintering raptors like Ferruginous or Rough-legged Hawk. Golden Eagle is possible year-round and Western Bluebird is regular. One year on a Godwit Days trip a first county record of Smith's Longspur was found! All birding will be from cars alongside the road with very minimal walking on mostly dirt/gravel roads. Bring a lunch. Restrooms are available before and after visiting Bear River Ridge. FR17 Freshwater Farms Reserve Trail

Join the Northcoast Regional Land Trust for a birding tour and discussion at Freshwater Farms Reserve. This beautifully restored 74-acre wild and working landscape demonstrates complementary land uses, supporting both ecological enhancement and agriculture. The nature trail meanders through meadows and rich pasture land into abundant salt marsh and estuary habitat. Wood Creek runs through the property, meeting with Freshwater Slough, which is part of the larger Humboldt Bay tributary complex. More than 175 species of birds have been seen on Freshwater Farms Reserve, including hawks, waterfowl, warblers and other songbirds, and a resident Barn Owl. The walk is approximately 1 mile on a maintained trail and includes a viewing platform overlooking the restored wetland. Wear appropriate footwear– the trail may be muddy in some areas. FR18 Seawood Cape Preserve

Seawood Cape Preserve is owned and operated by The Wildlands Conservancy, whose mission is to preserve the beauty and biodiversity of the Earth and provide programs so that children may know the wonder and joy of nature. Located in Yurok Ancestral Territory, situated between Trinidad Head and Sue-meg State Park, the preserve protects 128 acres of habitat that stretches from rocky coast to redwood forest. A pocket of wild – including coastal bluff, wet meadow, alder woodland, and spruce-fir and redwood forests – Seawood Cape Preserve provides refuge to a diversity of birds and other organisms in an otherwise human-altered landscape. Join us for a morning exploring this special place and its extensive biodiversity. This property is usually not

open to the public – except by reservation – so this is a special opportunity. Most of the trails are level and easy but can be wet on the east side. Restrooms available. See the birds found at this location during April [here](#).

FR19 North Jetty Sea Watch & Woodley Island **CLASSIC** **\$20**

The North Spit provides a variety of birding spots out to the jetty. Here the rocky shore specialists -- Surfbird, Black Turnstone, and Wandering Tattler – can be found. Sometimes even a late Rock Sandpiper is still present. If you have a spotting scope, this is an excellent time to bring it for scanning the ocean for seabirds and migrating Pacific Loons. Woodley Island, Vance Road, and the Samoa Bridge harbor nesting egrets, various other waterbird species, and shorebirds. Restrooms available near the North Jetty. Join Godwit Days trip as we visit the Sequoia Park Zoo early before it opens to the public and we get to go birding in the zoo and see what birds are using their extensive native plantings. The trip will also visit the new Redwood Sky Walk, giving a bird's eye perspective to redwood forest bird species like Golden-crowned Kinglet, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, and Brown Creeper. After visiting the zoo David will lead the group down to Sequoia Park where such charismatic species like Wood Duck and Barred Owl are possible. Fee includes entrance fee to Sequoia Park Zoo. FR21 Conifers & Birds of Horse Mountain **\$50**

Michael, an author and co-editor of the new book *The Klamath Mountains: A Natural History*, will lead a journey to Horse Mountain. Participants will explore the mutualistic relationships between birds and conifers and search out regionally exceptional examples of each. Stops include montane forest, serpentine ridgelines, and mountain meadows. Be prepared for snow and/or cold weather. Bird highlights could include Cassin's Vireo, Warbling Vireo, Bewick's Wren, Wilson's Warbler, Red-breasted

Sapsucker, and Townsend's Solitaire. Exceptional conifers include Port Orford-Cedar, Western White Pine, and Pacific Yew. Bring lunch, drink, hiking shoes, and warm clothes. Meet at the Humboldt Bay National Wildlife Refuge visitor center parking lot to start the trip by looking for songbirds such as Pacific-slope Flycatcher and lots of singing Yellow-rumped Warblers, plus various sparrows and finches that visit the feeders and native plant garden. We'll then walk the shorebird loop trail looking for waterfowl holding over from the winter, migrant shorebirds, and other marsh-associated species. After the refuge, we'll make our way to either the Loleta or Ferndale Bottoms, depending on recent reports or participants' desires. We might even head towards Ferndale and visit the cemetery to look for Canada Jays. Around 12:30-1:00 p.m. we'll head to Tuyas Mexican Restaurant in Ferndale for lunch. With time permitting after lunch we'll make a few more birding stops before getting back to Arcata by 3 p.m. Always a fun trip and a good one for beginners, as the pace is relaxed and we make a point to enjoy all species

FR25 Spotted Owls on Green Diamond Land 2 CLASSIC \$25

This trip is the epitome of what we term a "Classic Godwit Days Trip." Nowhere else in North America can you sign up for a trip and be almost guaranteed to SEE Spotted Owl. These trips have never missed Spotted Owls and often the experience is (enter any superlative you come up with!). Participants will visit known activity centers of Northern Spotted Owls in their nesting habitat with Green Diamond Resource Company biologists. The biologists are extremely knowledgeable about Spotted Owl biology, so not only will you hopefully get great looks at this threatened species, but you also will walk away knowing a lot more about their life history and biology. If the owls cooperate, this trip offers superb photographic opportunities. The owls come amazingly close as they swoop down for offered mice. Because the trip goes beyond a locked gate onto Green Diamond property, it cannot be joined up with after the group leaves the Community Center. Wear sturdy footwear, as off-trail hiking is sometimes involved, but many times walking is along gravel or dirt forest roads. No restrooms after the Community Center. The first detection of a “MAMU” will probably be the loud “keer” call, the most common call you hear during these dawn flights. The dawn chorus – including Varied Thrush, Pacific Wren, possibly Pileated Woodpecker, and often Northern Pygmy and Barred Owls – accompanies pre-dawn flights of the murrelets. It’s quite the experience seeing small seabirds that live most of their life on the ocean in flight among the ancient redwoods. Flat terrain, but can be damp so prepare for such conditions. SU61 Humboldt Bay Bird Observatory Banding **CLASSIC** **\$20**
7:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m. Leader: HBBO Staff

Bird banding uses mist nets to capture small birds and place bands around their legs to enable continuous monitoring through re-capture. The Humboldt Bay Bird Observatory was established in 1982 by Dr. CJ Ralph and Dr. Carol Pearson Ralph. HBBO is adjacent to the Lanphere Dunes Unit of the Humboldt Bay NWR, bordered by Mad River Slough and coastal dune forest. This variety of habitats supports a high diversity of bird species. Bird populations and demographics have been monitored at the station continuously since 1982, making HBBO one of the longest-running stations in the nation. Education and volunteer programs provide the opportunity to observe and learn about birds, bird monitoring, and research techniques. The banding program has grown into the Klamath Demographic Network that runs banding stations from southern Oregon through the Klamath and California North Coast regions and south to Mendocino County. Expect narrow trails and possibly wet ground. Restrooms are available. With the focus on passerines, a scope is not necessary. Species that have been recorded at HBBO in April can be seen [here](#).

The Eel River Estuary Preserve and Sounding Seas Dunes Reserve ("Preserves"), located in Humboldt County, are within The Wildlands Conservancy's (TWC) North Coast Region. They are part of TWC's expansive system of nature preserves, encompassing more than 315 square miles across 25 locations. TWC's mission is to preserve the beauty and biodiversity of the earth and provide programs so that youth may know the wonder and joy of nature.

Located where the Eel River meets the great Pacific, the Preserves encompass 1,300-acres of tidal wetlands, freshwater marsh, sand dunes, coastal grasslands, beach frontage, and a spectacular half-moon bay on the Eel River. Diverse habitats provide for a variety of species of birds including waterfowl, waders, shorebirds, birds of prey, and songbirds. Walking will be on relatively flat terrain. SU66 Shorebird Spectacle at the Arcata Marsh 4 CLASSIC \$15

Witness the spectacle as flocks of thousands of shorebirds become tens of thousands, and then form a huge milling swarm. North Humboldt Bay is a shorebird staging site clearly of hemispherical significance. The birds are colorful, sexually charged, and are flying in an energetic manner not seen in fall or winter, plus they often give snatches of summer “song” and other utterances seldom heard at other times. The number of birds on the move can be staggering and can be experienced daily during this northward spring migration push. Shorebird species expected include: Western and Least Sandpiper, Dunlin, Marbled Godwit, Willet, dowitchers, Black-bellied Plover and American Avocet. You may want to bring a snack, there are picnic tables and benches available. Bring a spotting scope if you have one. There will be a restroom available.

After scoping from King Salmon the trip will head over to the Fields Landing boat ramp to

The biologists are extremely knowledgeable about Spotted Owl biology, so not only will you hopefully get great looks at this threatened species, but you also will walk away knowing a lot more about their life history and biology. If the owls cooperate, this trip offers superb photographic opportunities. The owls come amazingly close as they swoop down for offered mice. Because the trip goes beyond a locked gate onto Green Diamond property, it cannot be joined up with after the group leaves the Community Center. Wear sturdy footwear, as off-trail hiking is sometimes involved, but many times walking is along gravel or dirt forest roads. No restrooms after the Community Center.
